Personal Testimony by Dr. Kaarina A. Ham

Throughout Scripture, the **number 40** has figured powerfully in the mighty acts of God, as revealed to His people. In the Hebrew Bible, the **number 40** is often used for time periods (forty days or forty years) which separate two distinct epochs. Several Jewish leaders and kings are said to have ruled for forty years, that is, a generation. Mentioned 146 times in Scripture, biblical scholars remind us that the **number 40** often symbolizes a period of testing or trial, ending with a blessing.

- Moses lived forty years in Egypt and forty years in the desert before God selected him to lead his people out of slavery
- Moses was also on Mount Sinai for 40 days and nights, on two separate occasions, receiving God's laws
- Moses sent spies for forty days to investigate the land God promised the Israelites as an inheritance
- Jonah powerfully warned ancient Nineveh for forty days that its destruction would come because of its many sins
- Ezekiel laid on His right side for 40 days to symbolize Judah's sins
- Elijah went 40 days without food or water at Mount Horeb
- Jesus was tempted by the devil not just three times, but many times during the 40 days and nights that he fasted just before his ministry began

- Jesus also appeared to his disciples and others for 40 days after his resurrection
- The **number 40** can also represent a generation.
- because of their sins after leaving Egypt, God swore that the generation of Israelites who left Egyptian bondage would not enter Canaan
- the children of Israel were punished by wandering the wilderness for 40 years before a new generation was allowed to possess the promised land
- Jesus, just days before his crucifixion, prophesied the total destruction of Jerusalem
- forty years after his crucifixion in 30 A.D., the mighty Roman Empire destroyed the city and burned its temple to the ground
- What serious, timely warnings and lessons for God's people down through the centuries—for saints of old with forward-looking faith toward the Coming of the Messiah, and for those of us with looking-back faith toward Jesus' saving work on the Cross, and all that it means for us now and eternally.
- Interestingly, the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church (AAOC) has been faithful to this Scriptural emphasis from its founding in 301 AD, all the way to the present. Here are some ways the **number 40** has traditionally figured into daily life.
- *Tearnendaraj* is a Feast Day on February 14th that continues for 40 days, to honor the consecration of Jesus when his parents Joseph and Mary presented him to Simeon in the Temple.
- After giving birth, mothers are considered unclean for 40 days. If

- a new mother wishes to enter the church during that time, she must kneel 40 times near the church door. Only then is she considered clean to participate in worship.
- Traditionally, after the birth of a baby, for 40 days the parents are not to take the baby outside, not to host guests in their home, to keep the child from infection. At times this tradition has led to superstition, and for this reason has lost some of its meaning.
- After 40 days, 40 cups of water are poured on a newborn baby before being brought to the church to be presented to the Lord. Then a special ceremony marking this "coming out" occasion takes place in the church.
- After someone passes away, 40 days of sorrow begin for relatives and loved ones. *Because it's impossible to mourn endlessly, on the 40th day they say "40" and continue the normal flow of life without falling into desperation (emphasis mine).*
- During Soviet times there was a well-known tradition not to celebrate a 40th birthday, because people tended to link it with death. Step by step in the post-Soviet period, this tradition is gradually fading.
- Of course, with biblical Mt. Ararat (Genesis chapters 6 – 9) in full view; common wisdom here in Armenia turns instinctively to the familiar account of the 40 days and 40 nights that Noah and his family were saved by faith from the deluge that covered the earth. Today there's Noy (Noah) water available in stores, beautiful paintings at souvenir markets of Noy and family descending from Mt. Ararat, Noyan Tapan (Noah's Ark) toys

Perspectives on HOPE

What an historic epoch unfolded in the late 1980s and early 1990s with the implosion of the Soviet system! As with people in other former Soviet Republics, Armenians have continued to struggle with rubble coming from that monolithic Empire. And what a difficult run it continues to be more than a quarter century later.

The former **Armenian Soviet Socialist Republic** (Armenian SSR) has in recent years experienced the devastating earthquake of 1988, the Nagorno-Karabakh War with Azerbaijan in the late 1980s and early 1990s (still unresolved), the propane gas blockade by Turkey and Azerbaijan in the early 1990s, and successive efforts at post-Soviet democratic-turned-dictatorial rule since then.

Since 2004 I have witnessed the despondency of the Armenian people in the ongoing struggle toward freedom and democracy. In March 2008 the political opposition made a valiant attempt to curb dictatorial powers, but this was brutally crushed, and dozens of deaths resulted. In April 2018, after years of desperation and attempts to emigrate to the West or Russia to find work, a clear majority finally said collectively, **Enough--why can't there be a viable future for us here!**

The weeks since the April 13 - May 8 **Velvet Revolution**, when an unpopular president-turned-prime minister was deposed through massive protest demonstrations (right at our doorstep!), have not been easy, due to strong efforts by hard-liners to remain in power. But gradually the will of the people has prevailed, and parliamentary elections have given rise to promising new leadership.

Here in this First Christian Nation (301 AD), we want to believe, as the prophet of old (*Jeremiah 29:11*), that there is **a hope and a future** for the Armenian people finally in their beloved homeland. Please join us in praying that it will be so!

in great supply, and lots of boys with the name Noy.

Also interestingly, the year 2019 marks the 40th milestone in my missionary career. So the biblical **number 40** has been taking on increasing significance for me personally. The years 1979 to present have held many cross-cultural trials and testings. There have been times when struggles have been so great that it's been tempting to question the Lord's calling on my life to missionary service. But along with ministry and personal lessons and challenges have come joys and blessings too. Excited responses in many countries to assistance and outreaches, and well-placed reassurance from family and friends, have always topped the list. To bring things up-to-date, for some time now, I've been receiving curious comments, such as:

- *what are your plans these days?*
- *when will you be returning home?*
- *are you thinking of RETIREMENT?*
- *aren't you sixty-something?*
- *isn't it time to wind down the engine!*

No doubt all the white garnered on top gradually over the past four decades is in large part responsible for these good-natured inquiries... Here are a few responses:

- *plans are indeed developing*
- *in December, at the end of this 3-year term*
- *I might be thinking of eventual corresponding changes, but without capital letters...*
- *yes, I am indeed sixty-never-mind!*
- *the engine, although it seems to tire more easily, continues to work quite well and happily, by God's grace...*

HOPE board members have been praying with me about my involvement going forward, now that we have a great team in Armenia with staff members who are capable, trustworthy, and fully committed to the Lord's work here. What we've come up with is **a new ministry plan** whereby I will **continue full-time** as general director for our mission---not based in Armenia, but rather from my home **in Northeast USA**.

My missionary career was launched in 1979 with a solo trip by ship to deliver Bibles and Christian literature in several Slavic languages from Helsinki, Finland to Leningrad in the **Russian Soviet Socialist Republic**. [Peter the Great's "Venice of the North" was known as **St. Petersburg** during the Tsarist Era, **Petrograd** during the Bolshevik Era, **Leningrad** throughout the Soviet Era, and now once again **St. Petersburg** in the post-Soviet Era.] It was a scary

venture in the still-formidable and repressive Brezhnev regime of the Late Soviet Period---but more about that and other memorable events in days to come.

There's been lots of historic water under the bridge in the lands of the former Soviet Union, to which the Lord called me after college and seminary training. All that missions from the West tried to do during these years was deeply impacted by the successive regimes of Leonid Brezhnev, Konstantin Chernenko, Yuri Andropov, Mikhail Gorbachev, Boris Yeltsin, and now Vladimir Putin.

My initial focus from Vienna, Austria with the Slavic Gospel Association was on the **Soviet Satellite** nations of East-Central Europe (particularly Hungary, Yugoslavia, Romania, Czechoslovakia, Poland, East Germany). Then pioneering work with Youth for Christ International (behind what Winston Churchill during a 1946 speech in Fulton, Missouri referred to as the **Iron Curtain**) took me farther into the Baltic nation of Estonia; then to Moscow in the Russian Federation; then to Samara-on-Volga in Central Russia. Then together with Tatevik Ghazaryan, Way of HOPE was established in 2006 in Yerevan, Armenia, from where the story of progress-through-struggle continues to unfold today.

One priority will be to start capturing in writing four decades of perspectives about ministries as a **witness to history** during the tumultuous Late Soviet Period, well into the present equally tumultuous post-Soviet period. This will include a look back at the years from the first Russian Revolution of 1905, to the early post-Soviet period of 1995, as highlighted in my 1998 dissertation. There are specific lessons to consider about God's ability to preserve and work among His people in, through, despite (!) even the most brutal of atheistic regimes, as in the case of the powerful Marxist-Leninist **Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR)**.

Here then is the plan. In December, Tatevik will continue as administrator of Way of HOPE in Armenia, my household goods will be shipped to Massachusetts, and I'll return to the USA to continue serving full-time as HOPE Armenia Ministries' general director from home. My major responsibilities will be:

- *to continue representing our mission throughout NE-USA*
- *to strengthen and extend HOPE prayer and support base*
- *to work with HOPE governing board in setting objectives and guiding ministries*
- *to send updates and reports to supporters of the mission*
- *to spend 3 months each year (May, June, and July) in Armenia*
- *to recruit and accompany Project PAROS summer mission teams to Armenia*
- *to write leadership perspectives on mission*

We look forward to Tatevik's trips to Massachusetts for 2 weeks during April of each year to attend board meetings, give updates at NE annual meetings, and meet representatives from churches with an interest in the Lord's work in Armenia.

Recently I've reflected on the wonderful ways **Psalms 121** (listed at the top of this article) has come down through the centuries in worship, even occasionally being set to music. King David was right---he knew where to look for help. In times of deep sadness, frustration, fear, failure, I too have found that it's best to just head for the hills. What wonderful assurance that **the Maker of heaven and earth** is deeply involved with the details of my life---frailties, misgivings, shortcomings, well-motivated contributions and all.

For fourteen of the **40 years** overseas, I've been awe-struck, humbled, and reassured as I've travelled around Yerevan, **lifting my eyes to biblical Mt. Ararat** (from which Noah and his sons Shem, Japheth, Ham descended long ago) ---snow-capped and magnificent every season of the year, steadfast in the sure promises of God. There's been lots of coming and going over the Atlantic and Black Seas. Praise the Lord that He can be trusted to continue watching over more such privileged exits and entrances, by His grace, **both now and forevermore**.

Where are They Now?

During recent Monday afternoon staff Bible study, we read the 16th chapter of the Book of Romans. In this inspiring passage, the apostle Paul gives greetings to the believers in the church in Rome, listing their names and their contributions to establishing faith in our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ in that important city.

At that moment I drew a deep parallel in my mind, comparing this with the recent past phenomenon of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR), to which our nation belonged for many decades as the **Armenian Soviet Socialist Republic (Armenian SSR)**.

Let me back up a bit. I was born, raised, and educated during Soviet times. This was a long period of rejection of the reign of God, due to the

fact that atheism was forced on us as the official ideology.

Broadly speaking, throughout the fifteen nations comprising the Soviet Union, there was a very high level of literacy. **But along with this came a very high level of empty ideas!** For

many decades, those tasked with enforcing Marxist-Leninist atheistic ideology focused tirelessly on the creation of false heroes, and the result that individual personalities and opinions were destroyed. Mass media, such as literature, drama, theater, cinema were great tools for disseminating these officially sanctioned ideas.

continued from page 3 We Armenians have always prided ourselves on our love of knowledge. In every Armenian home to this day you can see bookshelves full of books. However, what you won't see in our homes anymore is the twelve-volume collection of the enormous **Great Soviet Encyclopedia**.

During this Bible study, my thoughts raced to that huge Encyclopedia. Let me tell you why. We were taught from a young age that in that huge Encyclopedia you can find everything you need to know in life, including famous people, historic facts, scientific articles, etc. But everything was written in the spirit of Soviet ideology, and in many instances, information was completely falsified to conform to that ideology. Myriads of peoples' names were listed, and they were presented as famous heroes.

Well, over a quarter century has passed since the Soviet Marxist-Leninist atheistic system imploded. Life has changed dramatically from one system to another. Step by step the truth has been revealed about these so-called "famous heroes" of the Soviet period. The majority of these people were actually traitors whose hands were dipped in blood as they gave false testimony against neighbors and even family members. They were false intellectuals who were ready to face every humiliation just to have their names listed in the pages of the Soviet Encyclopedia forever.

What a disappointment if by some miracle these heroes could be alive today. They would discover quickly that these books with their names listed so visibly have mostly disappeared! Many of these books, where their supposedly immortal names were written, were burned in household stoves during the early 1990s when Armenia faced the crippling energy embargo brought about by Turkey and Azerbaijan. Many of these supposedly sacred books were even used as waste paper during this time of great struggle.

A great, miraculous irony is that another even **greater Book**, which was derided and forbidden during the Soviet era, and would never have appeared

openly on the bookshelves in our homes at that time, keeps making a wonderful come-back! No historic epoch or earthly regime, no matter how militaristic, has been able to quench its power. Gradually this book has been re-appearing in Armenians' homes. It is no longer hidden but is now openly available to those with *eyes to see* and *ears to hear* the truth of God's Word.

Looking back, there are marvelous examples during the terrible years of the *1915-18 Genocide Against the Armenian People*, even before the Bolshevik and Soviet eras, when Armenians risked their lives to save the Holy Bible from the enemy. There were even alarming cases when the choice was between saving the Holy Book or saving a child, and the choice was made for God's Holy Word.

Now when I read the greetings of the Apostle Paul to the Church in Rome, with the lists of individual believers' names, and specific commendation for their participation in the Gospel of our Lord, suddenly a smile comes to my face. That's the time when I silently compare these true spiritual heroes with the false heroes whose names were written in the huge Soviet Encyclopedia.

That earthly twelve-volume book, proudly touting lofty atheistic ideals, full of false stories and false heroes, was doomed by its intrinsic merit to the trash-heap of history. But the names written in the pages of God's holy revelation to His people over 2,000 years ago---***The Lamb's Book of Life (Revelation 21:27)***---will live forever!

In the previous article on *Armenian Church History and Tradition* (Summer 2017 edition *Lighthouse* brochure), I presented one of our most beautiful cities of antiquity, the historical city of **Ani**. This remarkable city was the capital of Armenia in the 10th and 11th centuries, with a population of around 100,000.

Today the ruins of ancient Ani are located in the Kars province of Turkey near the Armenian-Turkish border, 30 kilometers to the southwest of Gyumri (present-day Armenia's second city, after Yerevan). Clearly, the desire of every Armenian is to one day visit our historical fatherlands across the border and see with own eyes the ruins of this beloved city.

Last year my husband Suren and I had a great chance to take a three-day trip to Western Armenia, to this fatherland of our forebears; and to feast our eyes on the wonderful sights of the famous cities of Ani, Van, Kars, and Erzurum, which we had heard about all our lives.

It is well known that Armenia and Turkey for over 100 years have not had political relations, due to the fact that the Turkish government has not officially recognized the *1915-18 Genocide Against the Armenian People*. Therefore all our lives we had little chance of visiting Eastern Turkey, where much of the Genocide occurred, just over the border from Western Armenia.

But things are changing gradually! These days entrepreneurial tour operators are organizing tours across to Turkish territories, and many Armenians are taking advantage of the opportunities now offered.

We chose the services of a tour operator called *Narekavank*. Our trip began from Yerevan where we live, through southern Georgia, to the northeastern Turkish border. There we were met by Turkish drivers who transported our group for three days from one site to another. We were impressed that our Armenian escorts were very professional

and were fluent in Turkish, and therefore our group of fifty Armenian tourists realized that we would be well taken care of.

First we visited Ani, known throughout history as the *City of 1,001 Churches*. What a mixture of joy, delight sadness, regret, pain that this famous city of our heritage just over the border now rests in almost complete ruins. Today there are remains of just a few of these original glorious churches. Those that have been restored a little now exist without domes and crosses, since Turkey is officially an Islamic nation. It was very upsetting to see this.

We walked for a few amazing hours among the ruins, where long ago Armenian kings reigned supreme and the bells of Armenian churches pealed throughout the wide plain. Afterward we were hosted in a fine hotel in the city of Erzurum. It was interesting to taste Turkish food and become more familiar with Turkish culture.

The tour also took us to the historic cities of Van and Kars. It was very painful to see historic beautiful Armenian churches being turned into local mosques. For Suren and me, this was our first, but surely not our last, emotionally stirring visit to our historic, beloved fatherlands just across the border.
